

Your Missions Committee Wants YOU!

Several years ago, the CCCC Missions Committee came to realize that, while the Conference was excelling in supporting missions financially, we were not successful in missionary recruitment or strategy. Few of our local churches were actually raising up and sending out missionaries from within their own congregations, and the vast majority of our CCCC credentialed missionary laborers were actually serving in North America. At the time, less than 5% of our labor force was ministering within the least-reached region of the globe known as the 10/40 Window (10 to 40 degrees north of the equator, stretching from the Atlantic to the Pacific Ocean).

Your Missions Committee began a long process of study and strategy (that ultimately took over four years) to design a plan to not only correct those deficiencies, but to catalyze both vision and participation for missions in our local churches. Our desire is not to minimize or detract from any of the missionary work already happening through the Conference, but to begin slowly introducing some very purposeful, strategic partnerships that can address many of our CCCC mobilization issues at once. We want to be good stewards of our limited resources.



One of these strategic partnerships, approved and endorsed by our CCCC Board of Directors, is with *The Alliance for Saturation Church Planting*. Space here limits much discussion on the exciting ministry of *The Alliance* (please see the next issue of our Missions Committee Newsletter, *To The Ends of the Earth*, for more details), but suffice it to say, the potential impact for God's Kingdom is immense! The CCCC will be partnering with several other *Alliance* agencies (e.g., United World Mission) to help plant new, reproducing neighborhood churches in some of the least-reached areas of the former Soviet Union. Much of our work will directly impact the northern edge of the 10/40 Window!

An *extremely* important, one-week vision trip is planned for this coming February (2003). We are hoping to take with us a group of CCCC pastors and leaders to provide a first hand introduction to the on-site *Alliance* partners, the training process, and actual church plants in various levels of growth. Our desire is to then begin

building some specific partnerships with both our regional fellowships and local churches to see *The Alliance* meet (or exceed) the goal of planting 300 thriving churches in Central Asia within the next 5 years (90 are already successfully underway!).

Time is of the essence! If you are interested in participating in the vision trip, or would like more information about the partnership itself, please call Rev. John Bernard at (704) 357-3355, x104 today. The dates in February correspond with one of the vital training weeks in Central Asia so we don't want to miss it. *Your* participation could literally introduce the Gospel to a people who have never even heard the name of Jesus! Call today. And thanks so much for your prayers for this project.

From the Conference Minister



Church unity should be seen as a primary means of evangelism. In Jesus' great high priestly prayer, He prayed,

"May they be brought to complete unity to let the world know that you sent me and have loved them as you have loved me."

When Christians are in open conflict with each other, their testimony suffers. Many former church members now sit on the sidelines because of church conflicts they have experienced, and many unbelievers point to the disunity in churches as the reason they have no interest. I have never known of a church to grow in the midst of conflict, but I have known of many churches that have eventually closed their doors as a result. On the other hand, growing churches are generally characterized by a spirit of unity.

One of the organizations that has been very effective in promoting evangelism through unity is Mission America. Under the leadership of Dr. Paul Cedar, churches and church organizations are encouraged to work together by combining their resources in collaborative efforts to win the lost for Christ. Our testimony is enhanced to the degree we are able to present a united front to the world.

Churches are fragile because they are made up of fragile people. A church that has taken years to build can be destroyed in a few months by conflict and division. Paul challenged the Church "to make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace." Keeping unity takes effort and hard work, but the rewards of unity include the salvation of the lost.

As you develop plans for evangelism in your local church, don't forget to plan and pray for unity. Without it, all other

programs will fail. With it, your feeblest efforts will be fruitful. Jesus wants His Church to be one, "to let the world know."

Carlton's Comments



One of the joys of visiting Conference churches is to see the creative ways that many of them touch their communities for Jesus Christ. Last May I had the opportunity to preach at the Carthage Union Church in Dixfield, Maine. On the way to the church building, one is struck by woods as far as one can see on both sides of the road and signs warning drivers of the possibility of encountering moose! While there are moose in the neighborhood, there are also families who need Jesus Christ.

Michael Woodrell and his wife Linda have sensed God's call to minister for Him in this western Maine area. Besides traditional church programs, Mike and Linda have sought to reach out to the children and families by starting a unique Christian school. Until this fall the school met in rented facilities at the local Church of the Nazarene. This summer a modernized house and adjoining vacant lot in Dixfield was put on the market. The school put in a bid lower than the asking price and the bid was accepted. God provided funds necessary for the down payment and since September the new building is housing the Emmanuel Christian Academy!

Linda has been working very hard to develop a curriculum for the school that truly is unique and top of the line. Using high-end computers and creative teaching tools, Linda has been able to challenge the Academy's students whose ages range from kindergarten through grade twelve.

The purchase of the house and lot has depleted the school's funds, meaning

that the school needs help in supplying equipment and programs to expand its ministry. Perhaps you or the congregation you attend would like to take on a project to provide such immediate needs as computer software for science lab simulations on the high school level, financial help to go toward paying off the mortgage, high level computers and peripherals or lab supplies. As I visit our churches in the Northeast I take with me an extensive wish list of long and short-range needs for the school. I would be glad to mail you one.

Please pray that God will give Mike and Linda wisdom as they plan for and administer the Academy program. They would also appreciate prayer that more and more families will hear about the school and its unique program resulting in a growing student population and more people touched for Jesus Christ. One of the wonderful privileges we enjoy in the CCC is the opportunity to support one another in prayer and encouragement.

Mission Trip to India

In November of last year I received a call from a friend of mine, Rev. Paul Radford, from Seattle, WA asking me to go to India with him and four other men to speak at barefoot bush Pastor Prayer Summits. I was excited about this kind of missions trip so I accepted the invitation. Our team of six men had an incredible time in India this past June and July. Not only did we have the opportunity to go to a third world country, but we were asked by India Gospel League, Salem, India, to teach 560 young pastors in five locations on “The Fullness of Prayer Like Jesus” and “The Fullness of Obedience and Commitment.”

to Christ in their villages, they set up Bible Schools and Training Centers.

Even though India is 79 percent Hindu and 12 percent Muslim, there is a great openness to the Gospel. People who become converted have such a tremendous life changing experience they get very excited and bold about sharing their newly found faith.

At a Pastor's Prayer Summit in Southern India that had taken place just before we arrived, India Gospel League had given a young pastor a bicycle, a tambourine, and some Bibles. On his way home he was so overcome with joy that he stopped at a village and began to sing and play his tambourine. After he finished singing and sharing the Gospel with the crowd, he gave them an invitation to receive Christ. A good number of the Hindu people standing around opened their hearts to Jesus Christ and a new church was born.

During the two weeks our team was in India we sensed a real spirit of revival and spiritual awakening taking place. Yes, there is persecution and resistance to the preaching of the Gospel, but for the most part the Hindu people are very open to the Gospel. Let's pray for this country of over a billion people that this spiritual awakening that has already begun will reach into every village and major city.

Health Tips

- The special baby in your life needs to be in a safe sleep environment, which would include:
 - on their back to sleep in a crib
 - face is uncovered
 - no pillows, stuffed toys, bumper pads or quilts in the crib
 - tight fitting sheets on the mattress
 - dressed comfortably, not too warm
 - smoke free room
- Even in the winter we need to continue with an exercise program. Check with the local malls, schools or community centers to locate an indoor area for walking up to 30 minutes a day. Begin with a 5 minute walk on day one, increase to 10 minutes on the second day and by the end of the week you will be walking 30 minutes a day.
- If you have not had a mammogram or Prostate Specific Antigen (PSA) test in the last year and are over 50 years old, you may want to talk to your doctors and schedule one of these important tests.

Our Partnership with Micronesia

“It was He who gave some to be apostles, some to be prophets, some to be evangelists, and some to be pastors and teachers, to prepare God’s people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up until we all reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ. Then we will no longer be infants, tossed back and forth by the waves, and blown here and there by every wind of teaching and by the cunning and craftiness of men in their deceitful scheming.” (Ephesians 4:11-15)

Early in the 1980’s the CCCC was introduced to a group of churches in Micronesia that had been founded by congregational missionaries of the 19th century. These 20th century congregational churches were unhappy with their US church relationship and were looking for a group that “stuck to the Bible.” In the providence of God, the CCCC and Micronesia were brought together in a brother-to-brother ministry. Since the mid-eighties the CCCC has been ministering in Micronesia with the intent of “building up the body of Christ.” God has used our evangelical presence to strengthen their own ministries and to help them resist the “wind of teaching” which is not faithful to the Word of God.

Since 1993 Marilyn and I have lived as

invited to the main campus on Pohnpei. At our April 2002 groundbreaking ceremony for Mizpah’s two-story classroom building, the Lt. Governor of Chuuk said, “Mizpah is like ‘sacred ground’ and we are expecting much fruit in the years to come from the seeds which have been planted.” We are confident that Pat and Linda Chiles will be used of God to help Mizpah grow to a new level of excellence.

During these years we’ve also watched the Lord expand the CCCC ministry to church leaders. Begun in the early 1980’s by Rev. Rob Spiegel, the CCCC has enabled hundreds of church leaders on the islands of Pohnpei, Chuuk, and Saipan to obtain a basic Bible education. This is a strategic ministry and we are confident Gary and Kim Gardell will be used of God to develop new curriculum and expand the Morning Star Institute to other islands.

It has also been our great privilege to work with Logan Memorial Church and the Chuuk Congregational Church of Christ. Marilyn’s ministry to the women and children has been used of God to bring scores of children to Christ and to train a core of dedicated teachers. It was also my privilege to serve as associate pastor at LMC and to be involved in many levels of church ministry. It has been a joy to watch God at work as He strengthened older church leaders, raised up new ones, and helped the church become more faithful to the Word of God in its preaching and practices.

We praise the Lord for the privilege it has been to serve Him, our Conference, and His church in Micronesia. We praise the Lord for his faithful provision of financial and prayer support from many churches and individuals throughout the

Conference. And, we thank Him for raising up co-laborers who have served through

This committee has been tasked with reviewing and revising the Job Description for the Conference Minister and the Personal Profile that outlines the sort of person we desire to have for this position. When the review is completed, the search will begin for a candidate. The candidate’s name will be presented to the Board of Directors and then the entire Conference.

As Conference President, I would ask that all of us pray diligently and consistently for this committee and their tasks. Cliff has served the Lord and this Conference in a dynamic and powerful way. It will not be easy to find someone to take over where he is leaving off, but, as the Lord has provided in the past, so He will provide again!

He said, “It’s God’s work and it’s worth it!” That remains our conviction as well. It is God’s work! And, it is worth it! The Conference has invested much in this ministry and it is paying spiritual dividends. And, it is worth it!


