We are grateful for the work of Treasurer, Bob McKenney, who resigned in February. We welcomed Sue Drehmel to our committee as she was appointed Interim Treasurer by the Board of Directors at their February meeting.

We are pleased with the increased financial stability of the CCCC and appreciate the support of our Conference membership for the greater ministry of our fellowship.

This is my initial report as the incoming Treasurer for the CCCC. Bob McKenney was unable to serve out the final months of his term so I was asked to start mine early in February 2016. Thanks to Bob for the advancements he made with accounting records and putting the CCCC on a better track of capturing an accurate financial view into the future. I have been spending time at the CCCC office with staff to review accounting procedures and attended the closing meeting with the external auditors after my review of the 2015 Financial Statements. I was able to participate in two Finance Committee meetings and one Board meeting by conference call. It has been a learning process and will continue to be through the year.

In 2015 the CCCC Board, Officers, Finance Committee and staff kept a tight lid on expenses as we continue to focus on reducing the previous internal borrowings for operations from our temporary restricted funds. Net assets of \$36,487 were released from restrictions in 2015. With the auditor's guidance, we are confident that we will have repaid all temporary restricted funds in the next couple of years.

In 2015 general support was 2% over budget and expense was under budget by 5%. Giving was down \$62,813 from the prior year which reflected the end of the Comprehensive Campaign. There was an operating loss related to the 2015 Annual Gathering of \$17,432 but an overall surplus applied to the repayment of temporary restricted funds. Procedures have been put into place by the Finance Committee to improve expense control at the 2016 Annual Gathering.

In 2016, giving has been strong through May. There is a 9% increase over the prior year during the same time period. Again, staff has remained under budget with expenses by 3%. The Conference needs to stay focused on contributions through the end of 2016. We have always been blessed by strong year-end giving to meet our budget.

The 2017 budget, which will be presented at the Annual Gathering, shows a 2% increase in contributions, which has been allocated to fund compensation increase for part time office staff, employment taxes left out of prior year's budget and an increase in travel costs, as well as to continue to repay internal borrowings.

In summary, the CCCC continues to be aimed in the right direction with regard to finances. The Conference is in a healthier financial position than a few years ago. I look forward to working with the Board, Finance Committee, staff and auditors to continue this trend during my 3-year term. The finances are a vital piece in supporting the mission of the CCCC.

POSITION PAPER ON BIBLICAL STEWARDSHIP PROPOSAL

The Conservative Congregational Christian Conference (CCCC) is devoted to the Lordship of Christ over the local church and to the development of discipleship among our members. The purpose of this paper is to teach how stewardship flows from discipleship and to provide Scriptural teaching on giving and the support of Christian ministry.

The Tithe in the Old Testament

The Scriptures repeatedly emphasize the sacrificial giving of one's income to those in need. This generosity involves not only giving to the Lord's work in the faith community, but also to those outside the church for the purpose of missions. The Old Testament teaches that God's people should "tithe" (ten percent). In fact, the practice of tithing predates the revelation of Moses' Law. The earliest reference to tithing in the Bible shows that Abram gave "a tenth of everything" to Melchizedek, a priest of God Most High, as a thank offering for his protection in battle (Genesis 14:17-20). Jacob also pledged a tithe to God in response to the Lord's covenant promises (Genesis 28:20-22). In the Book of Leviticus, God required his people to give a "tithe" of their grain and of their "herd and flock, every tenth...to the Lord." (Leviticus 27:30, 32). Under the Mosaic Law, proceeds from their tithes were directed primarily to support the Levites and the priests who provided religious leadership (Numbers 18:21-29) and for the relief of the poor (Deuteronomy 14:22-29). The well-known verse from Malachi (3:10) called for God's people to "bring the full tithe into the storehouse;" an act of faith that would cause great favor to fall upon Israel and lead all nations to call God's people "blessed" and would transform Judah into "a land of delight" (Malachi 3:12).

The Old Testament also speaks often about various kinds of offerings – sin offering, guilt offering, and general benevolences to those in need of assistance, even strangers and travelers. (Leviticus 6-8, Deuteronomy 15:1-21; 16:10, Psalm 41:1) These were understood to be from the heart and in addition to the tithe. This is specifically addressed when Malachi speaks of "tithes and offerings" (Malachi 3:8), suggesting a distinction between what was expectedly due God and what was offered out of generosity. Thus giving was seen as a response to God, a part of one's partnership within the community of faith, and a means of compassionately responding to those in need.

Christian Stewardship in the New Testament

In Matthew 23:23, Jesus makes reference to the "tithe," noting that it has been distorted by the scribes and Pharisees into a legalistic practice: "Woe to you scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you tithe mint and dill and cumin, and have neglected the weightier matters of the law; justice, mercy and faithfulness. These you ought to have done, without neglecting the others." In this verse, Jesus pointed out that though they were scrupulous in tithing everything, they should not have neglected the heart of the law: justice, mercy, and faithfulness. It is important to note, however, that during Christ's earthly ministry and after his Resurrection and Ascension and the subsequent establishment of the New Testament church at Pentecost (Acts 2), the requirement to tithe one tenth of one's income" is never explicitly imposed on Christians. Rather than stipulating a fixed amount, the New Testament emphasizes generous, sacrificial,

and cheerful giving for "God loves a cheerful giver" who "sows bountifully." (2 Corinthians 9:6-7). The New Testament further promises that those who do this "will be enriched in every way to be generous in every way" (2 Corinthians 9:11). That means that God will bless us so that we can a blessing to others.

Thus, while Christians are not obligated to give a fixed amount, it is hard to imagine that God would expect the people of the New Covenant to give less than to tithe ten percent of their income like the people of the Old Covenant. In fact, the model of New Testament giving is the widow who gave her two mites (Mark 12:41-44). Jesus applauded her because she gave everything she had. She understood that God is the owner and we are the managers of his resources. He owns it all for "the earth is the LORD's and everything in it, the world and all who live in it" (Psalms 24:1). The New Testament specifically encourages that we are to assist those in need: "If anyone has the world's goods and sees his brothers in need, yet closes his heart against him, how does God's love abide in him?" (1 John 3:17). The Apostle Paul devoted a significant portion of his third missionary journey to collecting funds for the needs of poor Christians in Jerusalem (see Acts 21:17; 24:17; Romans 15:25-28,31; 1 Corinthians 16:1-4; 2 Corinthians 8:1-4, 9:12-15). Though it is right to give to the material needs of both believers and unbelievers (cf. Luke 6:32-36), the New Testament prioritizes giving to the needs of our brothers and sisters in Christ: "So then, as we have opportunity, let us do good to everyone, and especially to those who are of the household of faith" (Galatians 6:10).

The New Testament also places a significant emphasis on Christians financially supporting the needs of the local church and of those who do the work of ministry in the wider Church Universal through the proclamation of the Gospel (Galatians 6:6). The Apostle Paul received financial support from the Church in Philippi (cf. Philippians 4:15-19), and he commanded the New Testament churches to systematically support the ordained elders of their particular congregations: "especially those who labor in preaching and teaching, for the laborer deserves his wages." (1 Timothy 5:17-18; cf. 1 Corinthians 9:6-14).

The CCCC Position

Stewardship in the CCCC is based on three guiding principles that we believe are foundational to Christian discipleship and our covenant community of faith. First, God is the owner of all things, the Provider of all we have, and thus to be consulted in all things. Every decision is a stewardship decision, to be based on God's priorities. "The earth is the LORD's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it." (Psalm 24:1) The Holy Scriptures clearly teach that God owns everyone and everything.

Second, we believers are stewards of our lives and our possessions, not owners. God entrusts us with the decision of how God's wealth will be used according to our understanding of His purpose and guidance through Scripture and prayer.

Third, we are blessed so that we can bless others. From those who have much, more will be expected. As stewards of His wealth we are to use the Lord's resources to bless those both within and without the community of faith as a means of proclaiming God's glory, giving evidence to His compassion and grace, and witnessing to His presence.

Therefore, the CCCC affirms that proportionate and regular giving of our time, talent, and treasure is an act of devotion for both believers and congregations. God has called us to give to our local church and to the wider Church in order to spread the gospel and minister to the poor. Affirming the New Testament's teaching regarding Christian stewardship, the CCCC believes that, as true stewards of God's grace, we

Christians (and the Congregations to which we belong), must recognize that our lives in Jesus are not independent from other saints, but we also have a responsibility to support the whole Body of Christ and the world (see Romans 12:4-5, 2 Corinthians 8:13-14).

The members of a local congregation should regularly support the ministry of their church and the local church should regularly support the ministry of the gospel through the wider church. This understanding finds expression in the CCCC's Code of Ethics for Churches that states, "Believing that our membership in the Conservative Congregational Christian Conference is not a privilege but involves responsibility... We will fulfill our fellowship, ministry and financial obligations to the Conference to the best of our ability."

Giving is both the privilege and the duty of every believer. Planned sacrificial giving recognizes that everything we have comes from the Lord. It checks our greed, promotes personal discipline and thrift, testifies to our faith in Christ, promotes God's work in the world, and helps to eliminate human need.

Tithing is clearly not a requirement for New Testament believers and is certainly not a condition for salvation. While some can become legalistic about tithing and neglect to encourage cheerful giving, we do affirm that tithing is a wonderful spiritual discipline practiced as an expression of discipleship. The CCCC recognizes the personal and sensitive nature of every Christian's stewardship responsibility, and yet desires to emphasize that all believers are members of the wider Body of Christ and therefore, we must work together with all our fellow believers.

These principles will do much to build congregations of grace, thanksgiving, and joy as evidenced in 2 Corinthians 8-9. The CCCC believes that the joy of our salvation should motivate Christian giving (2 Corinthians 8:2). When Christians view their giving in light of Christ's self-giving, their attitude can only be transformed. Our ultimate purpose is to glorify God! "Yours, O God, is the greatness and the power and the glory and the victory and the majesty, for all that is in the heavens and in the earth is yours. Yours is the kingdom, O LORD, and you are exalted as head above all. For all things come from you, and of your own have we given you" (1 Chronicles 29:11, 14).



CONSTITUTION STUDIES COMMITTEE REPORT

After the intense work of the Bylaw revisions of last year, the committee, has rested. We have had a few interactions with Conference staff clarifying details. I am glad to say we have no major projects for the Conference this year.

There remains one piece of unfinished business from last year: A change regarding Article VIII.5 requested by the Board of Directors. While we as a Conference may propose Bylaw amendments for adoption at the Annual Gathering on a thirty-day notice, a proposed change to a Constitutional Article must be presented a year in advance before it can stand for a vote. This reading was done last year, and so the following is up for action this year.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL REVISION

Motion: to strike Article VIII.5 (de-commissioning Foresee Publications)

Article VIII - Board of Directors

5. The Board of Directors shall establish Foresee Publications as the Christian Education supply and publication arm of the Conference; such operation to be under the direction of the Board of Directors

Rationale: At its inception Foresee Publications was established as its own corporation. As we have (a) ceased most publishing activities, and (b) ceased being a vendor for other products, we need this action by the Conference to formally shut down the corporation. Remaining publishing activities of the Conference will continue to be done through the home office.

CHAPLAINCY COMMITTEE REPORT

Chaplaincy ministry is strong and thriving in the CCCC!

We have a dedicated group of pastors who are excelling at ministry in many venues, proclaiming the Gospel to hungry souls in our nation's military and in hospitals and prisons and other institutions around our nation.

We are particularly blessed with a strong core of chaplains in America's Armed Forces. The Air Force operates on a quota system and says our size entitles us to have only a single chaplain on active duty. The Army and Navy, on the other hand, operate on a best-qualified system. That difference enables us to have five chaplains on active duty in the Army and seven in the Navy – and more are being processed for both active duty and reserve slots. That's important because several of our chaplains will be retiring in the near future and that means we need to be working of developing a constant supply of dedicated and godly workers to work in the next generation.

In a phone conversation a few months ago with a senior sergeant in one of the services whose job is to recruit new chaplains and massage their paperwork through the system, and who obviously was unfamiliar with the Conservative Congregational Christian Conference, referred to this group as "Quad-Cs". Perhaps that speaks something to the outstanding performance rendered by dedicated chaplains. (I wonder what marketing might be able to do with this.

The Chaplain Committee was slightly reorganized this past year. It was decided that the three branches of chaplaincy that are full-time and occupational will have permanent seats on the committee. The Chair will advocate for any other chaplain issues

I was unable to attend the National Conference On Ministry To The Armed Forces in January due to surgical issues. Gary Eno attended in my stead and represented us well in that capacity.

When you see any of our chaplains at Conference be sure to greet them and ask them to share some highlights of their ministry. They would love to visit with you. Then remember to pray for them throughout the rest of the year.

MICRONESIA MINISTRIES COMMITTEE

The two ministries of the Micronesia Ministry Committee (MMC) have been the Morning Star Institute (MSI) and the Mizpah Christian High School (MCHS) in Chuuk. First the bad news, then the good. The school in Chuuk has not met this past school year and is not able to start this coming year in September. In May of this year when I was in Chuuk for an MSI class, I met with the principal and the chairman of the board of directors. Their message was that their greatest need is American Christian teachers. Since they have not decided whether to start up as a K-5 primary school or a vocational school, they are not ready to start this Fall. Please be in prayer for American Christian teachers and a decision on the part of the school board as to which way to go. My recommendation was for an elementary school to be a feeder for the middle or high school. Because of lack of facilities for public school children, Mizpah is being rented to the public school system for a middle school at the present time.

And now to the good news! MSI is growing and continues to multiply. As I anticipated in last year's report, Rev. Furacy Bonochou in Chuuk did begin teaching classes in the Fall and will do so again this Fall. We praise God for that! Kohne Ramon (Pohnpeian) and I continue to teach also. As I reported last year also, we had been asked to begin classes for Micronesians in Oklahoma and Iowa. Not only did Kohne do that but he has also started classes in Omaha, Nebraska, Kansas City, Missouri and Corsicana, Texas. He has also held additional classes this year in Iowa and Neosho (Goodman) Missouri and Oklahoma. In addition to that he lead two classes in January in Pohnpei. My plans include Chuukese churches in Hawaii twice this year as well as twice in Saipan, Guam, and Portland, Oregon. I plan to travel to Pohnpei for two weeks in August as I did last year. My plans are to conduct 13 classes this year and Kohne has already done eight.

I am also introducing other teachers to classes for future participation. Rev. Gary Gardell met with me for the June class in Portland. As he lives in Spokane, Washington, I am hoping that he can conduct future classes for me there. In October, I plan to take Dr. Phil Hoyer from Carlsbad Community Church with me to Saipan and Guam to meet the people there and to assist in the teaching in hopes that he will be involved there in the future.

I would like to ask the churches who have been supporting Mizpah to continue to support the Micronesia Ministry and the Morning Star Institute as this is an expanding ministry which is in need of financial support. We have 1127 students in our records who have taken classes with about 500 who are now active. Thank you for your consideration.

It is my privilege to pray on a regular basis for the thirty-three 4C churches and over ninety-five credentialed individuals here in northeastern Massachusetts. I remain a part of the executive committee for the New England Congregational Christian Fellowship, which meets once every other month in Bolton, MA. I was able to work with Ron Hamilton to set up for those meetings and to enlist the help of the folks of Palmwood Church to serve these groups. Palmwood Church provided meals for both the Board and the WECF delegates that week, assisted in the planning of a bus trip to St. Augustine (America's oldest city), planned a closing banquet for the WECF at a local Christian retreat center, and hosted Sunday worship at the hotel for everyone as the meetings closed. - Collaboration with Dr. David Kimberly, who has begun The Barnabas Ministry, a
 ministry of support and encouragement for missionaries and pastors through the
 Ohio Association of the CCCC's. Dave and I work together as to how he can help
 pastors/churches in the Area.
- The application/credentials process for Immanuel Church in Zanesville, Ohio to join the CCCC.
- Worship and celebration at the retirement of Steven Carmany after serving the United Church of Huntington for over 35 years.
- Peter Bridgewood was installed on May 22, 2016 as Pastor at Putnam Church in Marietta. OH.
- The Ohio Association of the CCCC's continues to meet three times yearly—for a Fall meeting, a Winter Banquet at Malone University, and this year a spring meeting at Christ Memorial Church in Roberstville, OH.
- Many contacts with individual pastors about decisions, joys, personal/family issues, and church issues. I have called and met with church leaders about their churches' interest in the Conference. There has been preliminary contact with churches interested in LifeFlow.
- Area Representative training and support.

NORTHEAST REGIONAL PASTOR

As I reflect back on the past year and the ministry activities since our last Annual Gathering, I am overwhelmed by God's goodness and blessing. At last year's Annual Gathering we approved our new Bylaws which now clearly align with our ministry priorities of Church Development, Church Multiplication and Conference Care. Since that time it has been exciting to see how those ministries have expanded regionally and flourished under the guidance of our three ministry directors. Also the Conference has been able to add an additional regional pastor, Cliff Christensen who along with myself work with our national directors to enhance our ministries at the regional and local level. Our goal is to establish effective ministry hubs in all regions of the country. To that end, there have been a number of "firsts" that have occurred in the Northeast.

To help with funding, a foundation has agreed to match my expenses for the next two years to help establish ministry Hubs. Another first is that a Conference Care team has been formed which includes the Conference Care Director and Regional Pastors who now meet on a regular basis to discuss how to best minister in Conference Care situations. This has already born much fruit.

Another first is that I have been able to work with the Director of Development in establishing development clusters of pastors and churches interested in revitalization in their communities. Another first is the implementation of Community Pastors Training at sites across the country. In the Northeast we have had eighteen pastors go through the training. In the area of Church Multiplication we were able to offer church planting assessment training with funds given for that purpose. Our establishment of ministry hubs that align with our ministry priorities will remain our focus well into the future, but I would have to say we are off to a good start.

In addition, there is unprecedented interest in the CCCC from churches and pastors outside the Conference. Many have a desire to join with us. Several churches in transition are seeking our help in best practices for this very critical time in the life of their church. More churches and pastors continue to join with us each year. As we partner with the major evangelical ministries in the Northeast we have become recognized as a Conference that is willing to come along side in ways that advance the Kingdom of God. In works of discipleship we partner with Vision New England and the Vere Institute. In works of revitalization we partner with Overseed and Interim Pastor Ministries. In the raising up of the next generation of leaders and offering ministry training we partner with Gordon Conwell Theological Seminary and the Antioch School. At a recent Northeast Regional Conference sponsored by Vision New England, we were blessed to host a booth and labor alongside a number of our ministry partners who are making a difference for Christ in the region.

In the past nine years it has been my joy to serve the Conference and I am humbled at the prospect of serving this next three year appointment as God allows.

I have maintained regular contact with our four Area Pastors – Dan Peterson in Minnesota and So. Dakota, Rich Cook in No. Dakota, Tim Sir in Iowa, and Dave Eisley in Wisconsin.

Community Pastors:

I attended the Community Pastors Training Session in Minnesota and have met regularly with a small cluster of pastors on the east side of St. Paul. My goal is to see Pastoral Communities developed throughout the Region.

Personal Contacts:

My goal is to personally visit with all of our member churches and credentialed members during the course of this first year. During the first quarter I visited 16 member churches, 2 churches in development, 32 credentialed members, and 14 non member ministers. I have found this to be of particular importance to those who, because of age, geography, finances, and other factors, have found it difficult to be active in Conference life. It has also been personally enjoyable.

I thank the Board for giving me this opportunity to serve. To God be the glory!

DIRECTOR OF CONFERENCE CARE

The major effort in the area of Conference Care in the past months has centered on the Community Pastors. The curriculum and workbook for the training events was reworked and adjusted, based on our past experience and the shorter time frame of the coming retreats. Three training events were planned: New England (March), Western Pennsylvania (April) and Minnesota (May). Pastors were invited and all the preparations, follow-up, printing of materials, and coordinating with presenters took much of my DCC time. But it was all worth it. The three events went very well, the participation was excellent (a total of 27 pastors were trained!), and the sharing honest and encouraging. Each event was different in size, setting and atmosphere, but each was stirring, stimulating and inspirational. This will hopefully lead to many more Community Pastor groups being formed around the Conference, and a growing network of pastors caring for pastors in a deeper way. My sincere thanks to those who helped present the materials: Paul McPheeters, Terry Shanahan, Bob Barber, Dan Peterson, Matt Milligan, and, of course, Ron Hamilton who presented at all three. Their leadership and input were invaluable and deeply appreciated. A generous grant covered our expenses!

Efforts were made to clarify the lines of authority and communication with the Credentials Committee in regards to the Minister Under Care process. We have a much better understanding of how to make sure we are following proper internal procedures and that the lines of communication are more open and clear. Several Minister Under Care teams concluded their work in recent months, with pastors who were then released from care after cooperating fully in a healing, caring process and being restored to full standing. At the current time, we have only one MUC team gearing up to begin work with a Conference pastor, and we pray for similar healing results from this one. The Minister Under Care program offers a pastor and their family the resources and support of the CCCC in coming to terms with all of the emotions and issues resulting from the difficult situations they face. The goal of the Minister Under Care program is always healing, restoration and preparation for future life and ministry.

Congregations around the Conference continue to minister to their communities and share Christ's Gospel, with a minimum of conflict or struggle. When situations do arise needing attention or support, we have fine people all around the nation who are capable and willing to step in and offer assistance, as has happened in recent month in several locations. My thanks to all who have offered their time and prayers in service to their fellow pastors and their congregations. An exciting development has been the appointment of Rev. Cliff Christensen to be our Regional Minister in the Upper Midwest. His wisdom and caring presence are already being felt as he hit the ground running with that ministry!

I was honored to be asked to serve our Conference as Director of Conference Care, first as a volunteer and then in the paid, part-time position. It has been a challenging, stretching and rewarding experience for me throughout, and I have greatly enjoyed working with Ron, Terry, John, and, of late, Rob. I respect all of them deeply and have been honored to be counted among them. However, I have become

convinced that I need to resign as DCC, effective July 31. I do this essentially because of priorities on which I am increasingly sure God is calling me to focus. First and foremost, is the priority of our Bible Club. We've invested eight years in that outreach effort, and it is expanding, offering us more and more opportunities to minister to the families and to further care for the children beyond the club itself. I thank you for the trust you placed in me in offering to me the roll of DCC, and for your patience and grace in working with me in that position, but I trust that there are many others in the Conference more than able to step in and continue the work we have begun.

DIRECTOR OF CHURCH DEVELOPMENT

The ministry of Church Development has been active this year. Since the last Annual Gathering in Rochester, my work has been a mixture of continued investment in existing Church Development relationships, establishing some new beachheads for our work, and an increased coaching and mentoring investment. I have traveled to our fall staff retreat in Wisconsin, presented several workshops as part of the 2015 Renovate National Church Revitalization Conference in Orlando, helped to lead a training event with our churches in the Pacific Northwest, held monthly Church Development Committee meetings and intercessory prayer gatherings online (and one face-to-face here in Oviedo, Florida), discussed "next steps" for mentored ministry with our church in Telford, Pennsylvania, and made an initial trip to the Northeast to help establish some new works.

· CLUSTERS

Over the last year the Church Development Committee has been diligently working to transition both our approach and our existing training hubs into ongoing "clusters" that can (and often do) coincide with what is happening locally with the CCCC Community Pastor initiative. Rather than providing training and then coaching churches from a distance through technology, we are slowly adapting our work to be led, trained and coached on the local level. Clusters of a few pastors gathering together for mutual ministry can now also partner in the ongoing work of Church Development through our process. By moving to a more local expression of our ministry, we have seen an increase in excitement and fruit, and are pleased that the Church Development emphasis in those places is now ongoing. We currently have works happening in the Pacific Northwest, Wisconsin, Western Pennsylvania and Ohio, Vermont, Massachusetts and North Dakota.

NEW YORK

In April, I traveled to Upstate New York to work with Peter Wood and Terry Shanahan in the establishment of new clusters for Church Development. At our Staff Retreat last fall, we spent time talking about where God has already gathered Community Pastor-type clusters that have an interest in Church Development. One of the places where it was clear the Spirit is moving in this way is in some existing clusters in both the Albany and the Syracuse areas. We met with several pastors in those regions over several days and are now doing follow up to help them successfully engage with us. We currently have two groups of pastors, but may have as many as four by the time this new work is underway. What's exciting is that these groups include pastors from other denominations as well.

· COACHING

In an effort to better coordinate the work of Church Development and also to invest more in our own team members, in 2016 I began holding regular, monthly coaching calls with the members of the Church Development Committee. These men are not just administrators of our process, but are local practitioners. Each is leading their own cluster of pastors. This is in addition to the regular coaching I am already doing and has helped to bring both resourcing and focus to my co-laborers.

As I note each year, I am so grateful for the partners I have in this ministry. Rich Cook has already listed our Committee and Team members in his report. The team grows a little each year as we expand our reach. And Rich's leadership is also a tremendous blessing. Thank you for allowing me to serve the Conference in this capacity.

CHURCH DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Matthew 22:36-40 (NIV)

DIRECTOR OF CHURCH MULTIPLICATION

COACHING MAKES THE DIFFERENCE.

This year we have focused on developing training for our coaches and building the systems to support our coaches. Church planters do difficult work, often on their own, and frequently with very little community surrounding them. Planting a church can be a lonely business. Our church planters thrive when we provide them with coaches. Planters connect with coaches. Coaches ask good questions. We are learning how to coach well and beginning to spread good coaching practices throughout the church multiplication movement.

ASSESSMENT DISCLOSES FIT AND FLOURISH.

This year the Church Multiplication Committee worked with the Conference Care Director and the Church Development Committee to design an assessment process that can help pastors at many points in ministry discover how God has put them together. This process provides important insights to people beginning pastoral ministry, making a transition, or seeking to increase their impact. Assessment asks, "Where do you fit and flourish in ministry?" As we help pastors to find their unique contributions, we help them to be more effective.

PLANTERS GET IT DONE.

This year plants that had been dreams became reality. Congregations in Chaska (MN), Richfield (MN), Chelmsford (MA), and Pauma Valley (CA) all began meeting weekly. It is a joy to hear of people becoming followers of Jesus, lives being changed, and communities being impacted. In Richfield, MN Jeremy Peters is leading Community Church Richfield. This congregation is reaching out to its community and seeking to serve in ways that the community values. When the church offered to buy food for semi-homeless teenagers who "couch surf," one of the administrators at the school was so moved that a message went to the Superintendent of Schools and a broad distribution list. The love of Jesus speaks loudly! All of this is happening in a community that has not seen a church planted in 25 years.

MAKING DISCIPLES IS THE ENGINE.

The lessons that we learn in the Church Multiplication Movement about starting churches successfully apply broadly. The bottom line is that churches multiply only when disciples multiply. We are all in the "business" of making disciples for Jesus. As we multiply disciples, we multiply leaders and groups. Ultimately, that multiplies churches. Will you join us? Church multiplication is not the work of a committee or a team. It is the work and life of the Conference. Please pray for us and consider being part of our work.

CHURCH MULTIPLICATION COMMITTEE

The Church Multiplication Committee met eight times this year. We have two very active "hubs," one in the Twin Cities and one in New England, which meet almost monthly and work closely with planters and potential planters in those areas of the country. We have another potential hub in the eastern OH, Western PA and NY area, that we're presently calling the "Great Lakes Hub." We're also continuing to connect with the LA area through Rob O'Neal with the hope that our former LA hub could eventually be re-ignited.

We have been discussing the formation of a "National" team. This team would take on broader responsibilities than the National Committee but would supplement the Committee. It would consist of about 12 people to oversee the Nineveh Project and link our assessors and training programs from hub to hub. This team would also support the regional pastors.

The Committee met in Orlando for our annual face-to-face meeting. We reviewed procedures for grant approval and Church-in-Development process, discussed the "National" team idea, the 2016 Nineveh Project in Carlsbad, CA, our committee's break-out session for the 2016 Annual Gathering, and an "exit" procedure for planting projects that end. We also met with the Church Development Committee to discuss a common assessment process.

This year the committee has financially supported four church planting projects: Community Church, Richfield, MN, Turning Point Church, Wayzata/Minnetonka, MN, The Agora Community, Rochester, NY, and Anchor Meetinghouse, New Bedford, MA.

The "Nineveh Project" is our networking conference that we've held for a few years. Last year we decided to pair the church planter's networking conference with the 2015 Annual Gathering. The committee believes this was a good move as it better stewards the cost and time of the planter, brought planters to the Annual Gathering, and opened the Annual Gathering with a focus for the planter. We provided a suite where the planters, the committee members, and others could gather and hang out. It gave the committee the opportunity to meet face-to-face with planters and potential planter and the connections made have continued beyond the gathering.

God is moving and doing some wonderful things among our church planting projects. Some examples include - Jeremy Peters, pastor of Community Church in Richfield, MN began their public worship services. Curtis Brown, pastor of Turning Point Church had 125 in their first public worship service. Jonathan Romig, pastor of Cornerstone Community Church (out of a legacy situation) is doing well. Dave Demelo, in New Bedford, MA began with a group a people doing outreach. Then folks began asking for more, and over time, a church has been born. Nate Hall came alongside Dave as the planting pastor, and is training Dave for future leadership. Matt Milligan, pastor of Living Pathway Church in Hudson, WI created a new vision video, moved into a local YMCA and have seen new people coming. The Great Exchange Church (Mike Goffe, pastor) are doing well in their new, public worship space. While we have rejoiced in this growth, we were also sad to see the ending of three of our planting projects: The Greenhouse Project, in Carlsbad, CA and The Agora Community, in Rochester, NY, and Mosaic Church, in Canton, OH.

MINISTRY PRIORITIES CONTINUED

Please continue to pray for our CCCC planters and their families and about the multiple ways that CCCC churches can get involved and support this priority of our Conference.

CONFERENCE SERVICES REPORTS: MISSIONS COMMITTEE

One of the purposes of the CCCC mission's committee is to assist member churches in expanding their missional vision to the whole world. (This was the emphasis discussed in last year's annual meeting). As reported in the yearbook, the CCCC is blessed to have 100 missionaries listed as members. This number includes 30 missionaries who serve overseas. Several in the USA are serving at college campuses. Some of our missionaries are underfunded, and would appreciate the churches prayer and financial support.

The mission's committee is available to assist church leaders in becoming acquainted with these missionaires, and giving a briefing on their work and needs.

Our committee has brochures available at the CCCC mission's table that give information concerning the pastor's scholarship fund. This fund provides up to \$1,500 to CCCC pastors who are planning to accompany church members on a short-term mission trip. This exposure to mission work and needs in a foreign country can be a good starting point for a church getting excited about extending their ministry overseas. Please pick up a brochure outlining the scholarship opportunity.

With the assistance of Kim Gardell, and the Communication Committee, the mission's committee hopes to acquaint CCCC churches with activities of various CCCC missionaries by publishing some news of their activities in the CCCC newsletter.

As reported last year, two missionary families were forced to leave their fields of ministry. They were jj and Stephanie Wessman, and children, who were forced from Israel, and Thomas and Rhonda Curry who were deported from India. Please continue to pray for their adjustment to a ministry in the USA.

Also continue to remember in prayer the family of Lucy Lincoln, who passed away in December, 2014. Lucy was a faithful Bible translator to the "Tat" peoples living in the Caucasus Mountains and Israel.

Thanks to our committee, Malcolm Collins, and Eugene Schamko, Michael Greene, and Roland Rose for their service. Also for the advice and assistance of Clair Longuevan, thanks as well to Art Fleming, who has left the committee.

REGIONAL MINISTRIES: THE GREATER NEW YORK CITY/NEW JERSEY AREA

While our part of the world is a heavily populated one, it is not the home to many Conference members. We are glad, however, that one new CCCC minster has come among us. Layne Mershimer accepted a call to First Congregational Church of Chester, NJ (unaffiliated). We have had the blessing of Layne joining our pastors' fellowship and are praying for a long and fruitful ministry. As Layne finishes the first year of his tenure at First Congregational it's encouraging to note that four of our area pastors have had long seasons of ministry at their respective churches: Bryan Burrell at Community Bible Church, Valley Cottage is in his 30th year, Kirk van der Swaagh of Neighborhood Church of Greenwich Village (NCGV), New York, NY, is in his 29th, and co-pastors Jack Roberts and Bob Hall of the Bronx Household of Faith (BHoF), Bronx, NY, are in their 44th and 43rd year, respectively. They can all testify to God's grace and mercy being evident year after year.

Expect Hope is the latest effort by the members of BHoF to respond to the needs of their neighborhood. Under the direction of member Emily Prins and the oversight of Hope Christian Center, a "residential program for men with life-controlling problems," Expect Hope seeks to "provide a supportive residence for expectant women while they build self-sustainable lives founded on faith in Jesus Christ." They are in the process of development and have a projected launch date of 2018. Hope Academy, a school for students "who are not succeeding in public or private schools and have little hope of earning a high school diploma," is anticipating their third successful year.

Two area churches, Community Bible Church, Inwood, NY, and First Congregational Church, Middletown, NY, have called non-CCCC pastors with whom I have no contact.

NCGV is prayerfully considering how they might best leverage the goodwill that has been built up with the non-Christians who regularly attend their jazz series and art installations. Additionally, they are grateful to the Lord for sustaining their ministry, Higher Ground, that offers discipleship to men and women experiencing unwanted same-sex attraction. New inquires about the ministry continue to be made.

No inquiries have been made about the Conference by either ministers or churches in the past year.
